



Cecil J. Schneer

January 7, 1923 - February 9, 2017

Exeter - Dr. Cecil J. Schneer, 94, of Exeter, passed away peacefully on Thursday, February 9, 2017 at his home.

Dr. Schneer was born in New York City on January 7, 1923, a son of the late Jacob and Sadie (Glass) Schneer.

Cecil was raised in the Far Rockaway neighborhood of Queens. He received his Bachelor's Degree in 1943, married his high school sweetheart, the late Mary N. (Barsam) Schneer, joined the US Navy and served in the Pacific Fleet, patrolling the west coast of the Americas.

After his discharge, Cecil entered graduate school and earned his Master's Degree in Geology from Harvard and his Doctorate from Cornell University.

Dr. Schneer taught at the University of New Hampshire in the Department of Earth Sciences from 1954 to 1988. In 1967 he directed the New Hampshire Inter-disciplinary Conference on the History of Geology and in 1976, served as secretary of the U.S. National Committee of the History of Geology. He was one of the founding members of the International Commission on the History of Geological Sciences and received many honors and awards for his research in the history of science and mineralogy. He also served as the editor of Scribner's Dictionary of Scientific Biography and authored over a dozen books.


He is survived by his daughter, Jean Silverman and his son, David Schneer both of Exeter. Dr. Schneer was predeceased by Mary, his beloved wife of over 58 years who died in 2001 and his brother Richard Schneer.
