Rye – Joyce M. Troy, 87, of Rye, passed away peacefully on Monday, December 27, 2021.

She was born in Glasgow, Scotland on November 25, 1934 a daughter of the late Andrew and Elsie (Tomlinson) Thomson.

Raised in Scotland, she moved to the states with her family at the age of 12 and settled in Winthrop, MA. She later married her first husband of 25 years, Donald R. Troy who was an Air Force veteran and together they resided throughout the United States following his career before making Rye their home in 1967.

Joyce worked in the banking industry her entire career, retiring from the former First National Bank of Portsmouth as Vice President.

She shared 22 years of marriage with her second husband, the late John Taylor who predeceased her in 2013.
