



Cecile M. "CeeCee" Bolduc

December 17, 1942 - May 9, 2024

Hampton - Cecile Marie Bolduc, known as CeeCee, died peacefully in her sleep after a long illness on May 9, 2024.

CeeCee was born in Lowell, MA on December 17, 1942. She was the youngest of six children born to Geraldine (Chouinard) and Louis J. Bolduc. She graduated from St. Joseph High School in 1960.

For many years CeeCee worked as a secretary, office assistant, and office manager at Raytheon, the Greater Lawrence Ecumenical Area Ministry (GLEAM), and other businesses in the Merrimack Valley. Later in life she was employed by Seniors Helping Seniors of Bedford, NH and was also a childcare provider and eldercare volunteer in the seacoast region.

She and former husband Gary P. Snoonian of Lawrence MA married in 1967, had three children, and lived in Lawrence, Tewksbury, and West Newbury, MA. She settled in Hampton NH in the mid-1990s and loved living near the seacoast, where she took walks along the shore year-round and visited the beach in warmer months.

Although she grew to dislike cooking later in life, her three kids loved the rice pilaf, spaghetti and meatballs, and chicken cutlets she made for them when they were young. She was cherished by her parents-in-law Rose and Kaiser

Snoonian, whom she saw frequently when they all lived in Lawrence.

CeeCee loved the ocean, her seacoast neighborhood, gardening, flowers, sparkly jewelry, fuzzy scarves and sweaters, TV comedies, the movies Moonstruck and The Ref, miniature golfing, music (especially 1970s disco), taking walks, going for drives along the coast, doing crossword puzzles, and attending church events. She was an active member of the Portsmouth Believers congregation in Portsmouth, NH.

More than anything, she embraced her role of grandmother or “Minga” to her three grandchildren, Julia and Elise Snoonian of Los Angeles and Simon Peter Glenn, also of Los Angeles. She cherished her visits with them, doted on them with attention and gifts, and took them on fun excursions around the seacoast whenever they had sleepovers at her home.

She is survived by them and by her three children, Gary David Snoonian and his wife Collette of Los Angeles, Deborah Snoonian Glenn of Los Angeles, and Jeffrey Snoonian of Adams, MA; her sisters Lorraine Bolduc of Arlington, TX, and Charlotte Bolduc; and many nieces and nephews around the country, as well as friends and extended family throughout the seacoast and in the Merrimack Valley. She was predeceased by her brothers Roger Bolduc of Bandera, TX; Jacqueline Lamoreaux of Lowell, MA; and Louis Bolduc of Pittsfield, MA..

A memorial gathering in New Hampshire will be held at a future date this summer.
