One distinct memory I'll always carry is the two of us getting our hands on *Pulp Fiction* in 8th grade, stalking the Blockbuster drop off and returns area. And of course, he was always up for a trip to the actual movies. Right, Ashley? *Sleepy Hollow* comes to mind.

As we became parents and settled in different parts of the country, we didn't see or talk as much, mostly just texts. His daughter Lilah and my daughter are about three months apart in age. I regret I didn't keep in contact like I should have. But I always knew that when we did cross paths, it was effortless, picking up exactly where we left off. Recommending movies and shows, acting like fools, and laughing. Always laughing.

This past week, I've been witness to the sheer positive impact Cory left on so many people. His kindness. His "joie de vivre" as Mrs. Scarcia would say. We need more people like Cory Hartman. They make life worth living.

“ There are people in your life that you move away from or eventually lose touch with. Months or years pass before you get a chance to reconnect, but then when you do, it’s like no time has passed at all. Cory was that person. He was the exact same loveable, goofy guy at age 43 as he was at age 7.

We grew up being kids together: In 4th grade, we started rollerblading. We were jumping off of the highest steps we could find, and grinding every rail in Muhlenberg College until they kicked us out... and they always kicked us out. That evolved into mountain biking in the Lehigh Parkway. I followed Cory down the steepest dirt descents that we could find. He was a great athlete, and always pushed me to another level... except for basketball, he couldn’t quite figure that one out. 😊 In high school, we skied together a lot. We got season passes to Blue Mountain and would often drive up immediately after school just to get a couple of hours of night skiing in before driving back home. Cory used to blast his Oasis mixtape in the gray Saab every time we drove up. To this day, I am transported back to those exact moments every time I hear an Oasis song. Later we went to separate colleges, but still saw each other whenever possible. Without Cory, I don’t think that I would have ever found my love for skiing, which was the catalyst for my move to California where I met my wife and started a wonderful family. I’m forever grateful for that.

We still got to spend time together later in life because we shared a love for cycling. He joined the Pennsylvania Perimeter Ride Against Cancer for a few iterations. We would ride together for 6 days and 500 miles and catch up on everything that we had missed over the years. It was wonderful.

I’m so incredibly lucky to have known Cory, but also so devastated that he is no longer with us.

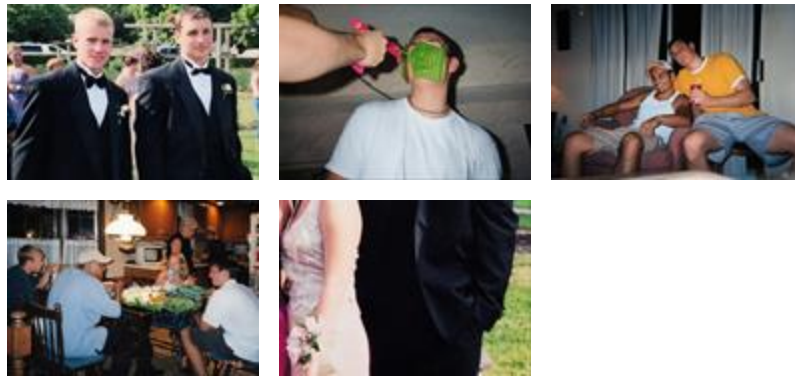
