



Edgar O. Savage

November 29, 1947 - August 20, 2022

Seabrook - Edgar Osborne Savage, 74, of Seabrook, passed away peacefully on Saturday, August 20, 2022 after a lengthy illness complicated by Covid. He was born November 29, 1947 in Framingham, MA, a son of the late Winthrop and Helen (Whitehouse) Savage.

Edgar was a multi-sport star athlete and 1965 graduate of Winnacunnet High School. He went on to earn his Bachelor's Degree from the University of New Hampshire where he was a varsity football player, winning several regional awards, including ECAC player of the week for his performance as a defensive middle guard. Edgar was employed for over 30 years as a physical education teacher at the Hampton Academy Junior High School in Hampton where he touched the lives of many students as a teacher, mentor and coach. He was also active in officiating youth sports, his favorites being lacrosse and soccer.

He was a 50 year resident of Newmarket, NH before moving to Seabrook in 2018.

Edgar is survived by his son, Kenneth Savage of Newmarket, his sister Natalie Savage Brown of Seabrook, his brother Richard Savage of Knox, ME and numerous nieces and nephews. In addition to his parents, Edgar was predeceased by his brother Mark Savage and his sister, Virginia Sadler.

“Edgar and I came to Hampton Academy in September of 1970. He was larger than life, and so happy to be back in his junior high. Some of his teachers became his colleagues. He immediately became a beloved and well respected teacher and coach. In a time when too many of our students were living in campgrounds for part of the school year, Ed made certain locker room showers were open early in the morning, and collected towels for kids use. He worked with the staff to provide help for every student in need. Ed set up a fund for scholarships for Environmental School, so that any child could attend. And he loved being outside learning with the kids. During the Blizzard of 1978, he led the way re-organizing activities so that we were able to include all planned activities and classes during the blizzard. He did this after injuring his shoulder when his snow tube crashed in to a tree. Edgar was a giant of a man, physically. His heart was even larger. He was at Hampton Academy when it was the very best time to be a teacher. If teachers had families, they most likely qualified for food stamps, and we became more of a family than imaginable. Ed knew how to make the very best of those times. Edgar was a complex person, beyond my ability to fully understand. But in our years together, he was a good and true friend, and amazing teacher, coach, and mentor to many young people, and a man worthy of being remembered as a true teacher. Godspeed Edgar.

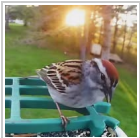
