



Helen D. Hobbs

June 6, 1920 - June 25, 2013

Concord – Helen D. Hobbs, 93, of Concord, formerly of Hampton, died Tuesday, June 25, 2013 at Havenwood Heritage-Heights where she has resided since 2003. .

She was born in Waterbury, Conn. on June 6, 1920, the daughter of the late Frederick and Sarah (Wagner) Davis.

Mrs. Hobbs was raised in central Pa. She received her Liberal Arts degree in education from Grove City College in Grove City, Pa. and her Master's degree from Penn State College.

She was a teacher in Hollidaysburg, Pa. and at the Hockaday School for Girls in Dallas, Tex. She then returned north to teach at Great Neck High School, Great Neck, N.Y. for many years.

In 1958 she married the late Stillman M. Hobbs and they enjoyed thirty years of marriage in Hampton, until his death in 1988. She was also predeceased by her stepson, Douglas S. Hobbs. Mrs. Hobbs was a member of the Hampton Historical Society, the James House Association and a volunteer at the Lane Memorial Library. In 1978 Mr. & Mrs. Hobbs co-authored "The Way It Was in North Hampton", the first written history of that town.

While residing in Hampton, Mrs. Hobbs was a communicant of Trinity

Episcopal Church and later Christ Church Episcopal in Exeter. Since moving to Concord she attended Grace Episcopal Church. .

She leaves nieces, nephews and good friends, Holly Hill and James Sheehy.

There will be no visiting hours. A memorial service will be held at 1 P.M. Monday, July 1, 2013 at Christ Church Episcopal, 43 Pine Street, Exeter. Relatives and friends are respectfully invited. Private interment will be in the High Street, Cemetery, Hampton. Arrangements are by the Remick & Gendron Funeral Home-Crematory, Hampton.
